## Local rides

Starting at Outer Banks Harley-Davidson in Harbinger, North Carolina, go south on US-158, proceeding over the 2.8-mile Wright Memorial Bridge. Once in Kitty Hawk, you can head north 20 miles on NC-12 past Duck and into Corolla where you can take a wild horse tour through Currituck National Wildlife Refuge. Or, after the bridge, head south on NC-12 Virginia Dare Trail, past Wright Brothers National Memorial, then through Cape Hatteras National Park where you can take a detour to the Bodie Island Lighthouse. Proceed south on NC-12 crossing the Oregon Inlet Bridge into Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge, all the way to the tip of Hatteras Island where you and your motorcycle can take the free ferry to Ocracoke Island to view more wild horses and where pirate lore abounds. An alternate route takes you from Nags Head, going west on US-64 over the Virginia Dare Memorial Bridge, past Roanoke Island, making a loop around Alligator River National Wildlife Refuge and Lake Mattamuskeet, up to Columbia and back over the bridge to Nags Head. There are several days' worth of rides here; don't try to jam all your sightseeing into a single day!
